With many students at this stage also undertaking vocational courses there was great news with a **100% pass rate in BTECs** and many individuals achieving

distinction level results.

Mr David Ward said. "This is a fantastic set of results. My congratulations go to each and every student and to our dedicated, supportive teaching staff."

Notable individuals included Anna McIntyre, who achieved nine GCSEs at grades A*-C, including 2 A* and 4 As. Sarah Freeman achieved 4 A's and a Distinction in her BTEC Business Studies. And Helena Blatchford also obtained 2 A*s amongst her GCSE grades.

JOHN DOUGLAS BROWN ____

John Brown, Bredon's Head Boy 2015/2016, sadly lost his battle with cancer in September. Despite being poorly and still receiving treatment, John delivered his Head Boy's speech at Founder's Day on July 7th 2016 and in doing so, realised his almost lifelong ambition to be Bredon's Head Boy.



His speech was humorous and delivered with confidence and maturity beyond his years. John's 10 minutes in the spotlight on that day will stay with us all forever. What came across so strongly was how much he loved his parents, his School, his friends and the teachers who had supported him throughout his eleven years at Bredon. John joined Bredon as a Year 3 pupil. By his own admission, at the time, he couldn't read or write and he certainly did not have the confidence to speak in front of people.

Throughout John's time at Bredon, he grew in confidence, academic ability and stature and was often highly praised for his friendly and polite manner and for his obvious enthusiasm for everything at school.

He excelled at the adventure training opportunities provided by Bredon and just months before he became ill, he completed his Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award. A DofE Cup has been donated in his memory to be awarded on Founder's Day.

Bredon's Matron, Mrs Roberts says, "My earliest memory of John is of him as a little boy who used to run up to me and give me a cuddle. I remember his Mum saying that if John liked you, you had a friend for life and that's certainly how he made me feel.

"Watching him deliver his speech on Founder's Day as Head Boy made me so proud; he'd come such a long way from those early days at Bredon."

Following John's death in September, the School opened a book of condolence. The stories, memories and comments shared within the books demonstrated how much he was respected by fellow students and how his pleasant, cheerful nature had touched teachers, visitors to the School, parents, prospective parents and many others. John is sadly missed.

COMBINED CADET FORCE

DUKE OF EDINBURGH

Silver award DofE students went canoeing on the Avon and Thames Rivers over three days, whilst Gold award participants completed four full days of canoeing on the River Severn from Pool Quays to Bewdley and on the River Wye, from Hay on Wye all the way to Monmouth.

Part of DofE essential skills is orienteering, which the students had to do for themselves on the walking components of their awards.

Learning outside the classroom is a key priority here at Bredon because how and where we learn is equally as important as what we learn.

By taking lessons outside, it has been proven to help increase understanding, skills, values, motivation, as well as contributing to personal and social development.

Our youngest students have been participating in a variety of activities this year including Forest School; learning how to make dens, how to whittle sticks, how to toast marshmallows and, importantly, having fun and getting muddy on the mud slide!

They've also tried their hand at kayaking and climbing and had four sessions of cycling with Ms Parkes, focusing on balance, cornering, braking, descending and climbing!

One of our Scottish Black Face ewes lambed quadruplets. This is particularly unusual given the harsh climate of the Scottish mountains where the breed originates, they rarely have more than one or two lambs to take care of at any one time.

The ram is a Beltex and the result is four sturdy little lambs with black noses, typically full of life and the joys of Spring!



One of our turkeys was badly bullied by some of the other birds so she was rescued from them - and the Christmas dinner table - and has become a permanent resident on the farm. She has even started to lay eggs - we're all intrigued as to what a turkey's egg tastes like!

Produce

The School Farm is linking up with Mr Crwys-Williams' catering department and FAB to start to generate more Bredon School produce.

Inspired by the apple juice, the farm is now providing the catering department with sausages and is growing vegetables to order in the school's polytunnels and allotments.

There are plans to move into horticultural produce too. Look out for potted bulbs and also had the opportunity to meet one of her heroes champion jockey (and Old Bredonian) Richard Johnson.

Humanities visit The Bay of Naples



In March, the Geography and History Departments arranged an expedition to the Bay of Naples.

30 students and staff made the trip to explore the physical, historical and cultural highlights from this unique and beautiful region of Italy.





Highlights included the ruins of both Herculaneum and Pompeii; a complete Roman City buried in an eruption of Vesuvius in AD79. Hidden for centuries, modern excavations have revealed the rich and elegant Roman resort with complete streets, shops, beautiful villas, gardens, sculptures and exquisite wall paintings.

Students and staff also took a hydrofoil to the Island of Capri for an all day excursion. Lying off the tip of the Sorrento Peninsular on the south side of the Bay of Naples, Capri has a rugged landscape, covered in luxurious vegetation, which has been popular with celebrities, artists, writers, musicians and actors.

The trip also took in two volcanoes; Solfatara (pictured) - whose name comes from the Latin Sulpha Terra land of sulphur - and is the crater of an extinct volcano which still emits jets of steam with sulphurous fumes. The vapours have been used for medicinal purposes since Roman times.

And Vesuvius - one of the few active volcanoes in Europe. The lower slopes are very fertile and covered with orchards and vines.



Special Guests and Visitors

In November, we were delighted to welcome two former students of Wells Court Prep School. Wells Court Prep, part of the former Wells House School in Malvern Wells, was based at Pull Court in the 1950/60s, before Bredon School came into existence.

David Cash and John Alexander were just seven years old when they started here. They have many fond memories of the grounds, particularly the trees and the woodland, the ice house and of making dens in what we now call the Forest School.

The current Principal's study was the library, where the boys could read and listen to the radio. They often listened to stories in front of the fire whilst eating toast with marmite and tomatoes!

Rugby and cricket were the most frequently played sports, played on what are still the sports pitches today. They remember Spaniels lounging around the entrance hall and up to 12 beds to a dormitory!

Mr Cash wrote in after his visit to thank the school for allowing him to have a look round. He said, "I cannot believe it is 60 years or so since our days at what was then Wells Court. I so appreciated your facilitating the reliving of old memories. (They were) happy days – even though very austere compared with your wonderful facilities today!".

Alex Alley -The Pixel Boat Challenge

In March, students were enthralled by Round the World yachtsman Alex Alley who was in School to talk about his forthcoming World Record attempt.

Alex will be attempting to sail solo, non-stop, round the world in a boat 40' and under - Class40. The current record stands at 137 days, 20 hours, 1 minute and 57 seconds and Alex is hopeful that he will beat this.

To fund his attempt, Alex is selling pixels on the side of his boat 'Pixel Flyer' and Bredon has purchased a space for our seahorse. Alex is offering staff, students and parents the opportunity to buy a pixel and feature on his world record attempt boat too! Inspirational stuff.

Sam is now a professional portrait photographer with a successful studio in The Suffolks in Cheltenham.

In his spare time, he works with dyslexia charities and is a keen advocate for Bredon School, attending events and functions on behalf of the School and inspiring current students to find their own 'dyslexic genius'.

He spoke eloquently and movingly at the School's main open day in May where staff, students and prospective families listened to his inspirational story.

During Dyslexia Awareness Week students took part in fun activities, heard inspirational talks and learnt more about how it feels to have dyslexia.

Old Bredonian Sam Oldfield came in to talk in Assembly about his memories from his time at Bredon and his current career as a professional photographer. He talked openly and honestly about some of his struggles at school and how he eventually

identified his 'dyslexic genius', which lead him into the career he loves today. He also talked about his work with a national Dyslexia charity.

In the Junior School, our youngest students enjoyed creating traffic signs with their fingers and paint.

While Senior students took their learning outside of the classroom, working on short term outcomes with vowel sounds using diacritical marks (marcons and breves) using chalk and water-gun games!

In the Access Centre, students tried the same using salt and cotton buds. as well as play dough! In Geography, students used Lego to make Tectonic plates.


